


Strengthening the Advocacy Groups – Women And other Networks (SAGWAN) on Watershed Rehabilitation and Conservation





About Calumpang Watershed

Batangas Bay Watershed which is also known as Calumpang River is considered as the largest basin in the Province of Batangas. The watershed has the catchment area of 472 km2 traversing through five towns and two cities which water drains into Batangas Bay. It is also considered as one of the most important tributaries of Verde Island Passage Marine Corridor, the world's "center of the center of the center of marine shore fish biodiversity". (Kent Carpenter and Victor Springer, 2005).



About Calumpang Watershed

In the State of the River Basin Report for Batangas Bay (2019) of Provincial Government – Environment and Natural Resources Office (PG ENRO), the Calumpang Watershed can be classified in critical state in terms of pollution loads, ecosystem services, rate of urbanization and degradation.

The condition of the watershed is declining. Despite numerous projects, programs, and activities conducted, Calumpang river's water quality is still not improving with the mostly band-aid solutions. It still calls for action. College of Arts and Sciences through **BS Development Communication (DEVCOM)** is one of the programs in Batangas State University-Pablo Borbon Campus that respond to the challenges of rehabilitating the Calumpang River. Since 2011, DEVCOM has conducted research, projects and activities which aimed to increase the knowledge and awareness of communities bordering Calumpang River.

To date, a total six researches were conducted, eight audio visual materials, five lectures and paper presentations, six printed materials which include posters, brochures and flyers were produced.



CALUMPang-ugnayan is the first phase of the WAVE Program. WAVE stands for Watershed Advocacy towards Sustainable and Viable Environment: A Calumpang Watershed Rehabilitation Program, proposed by the Office of Vice Chancellor for Research, Development and Extension Services.

What is

CALUMPang-ugnayan advocates for the creation of Calumpang Watershed Multi-Stakeholder Network, a watershed rehabilitation and management network from various organizations, groups and agencies that will manage the sustainable rehabilitation efforts and management of Calumpang Watershed.

It calls for volunteers, partners, and sponsors that will play a big role on watershed rehabilitation. It will create space for a community advocating for one cause.

What is







This is the first meeting of all participants via Google meet. Three professionals who worked on projects and programs to save Calumpang will be invited, and they will share their experiences with the participants.



This is the main event of the project. Professionals who are knowledgeable about water rehabilitation and conservation will be invited as resource speakers. This will be conducted via zoom with registered participants and will be broadcasted live on Facebook.

Calumpang Rehab project lists over 150 volunteers, 11 partners



As of April 30th, CALUMPANG-Ugnayan counts 155 volunteers and 11 partners and sponsors from different sectors of community, data shows.


To inspire the participants, Dr. Romel U. Briones, Assistant Director for Agriculture, Aquatic, and Natural Resources Research who also served as the first speaker, discussed the threats of watershed destruction to the community.

According to her, saving Calumpang should be a collaborative effort among the academe, government, NGOs, and the community.
