New BatStateU mandate supports student council autonomy

Batangas State University (BatStateU) is supporting student autonomy, as strengthened by the Republic Act No. 11694 provisions. This new declaration upholds the independence of the University Student Council (USC), solidifying its role as the primary representative body of the student body.

Even before the passage of RA 11694, USC has a dedicated office in the University. USC on the other hand has demonstrated its commitment to student welfare by regularly reviewing the constitution and by-laws and approving the student body, outlining the council's structure, powers, and responsibilities.

To ensure objectivity and impartiality, USC has selected faculty members to serve as advisors. These academic mentors provide guidance and support, upholding the council's adherence to university policies and academic standards.

Under the new law, USC empowers to advocate for student interests, initiate projects, and organize events that contribute to the overall development of the student body.

Balancing academic commitments, personal schedules, and extracurricular involvement hindered some members from actively participating in the virtual assemblies.

**3. Hosting Responsibilities**. The rotational system for hosting assemblies required meticulous coordination among UWOs. Ensuring that each hosting organization adequately prepared,

delivered informative sessions, and facilitated meaningful interactions was a challenge, especially considering varying levels of expertise in event planning and hosting.

#### Recommendations



#### NASUGBU CAMPUS



2. Centralized Communication Channel. Create a centralized communication channel, such as a dedicated online platform or email system, where updates, announcements, and information about the project can be shared with representatives from each campus. This will ensure that all campuses are on the same page and have access to necessary information.
